General Election Proclamation.

PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled 'An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth.'

One person for Canal Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

One person for Auditor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

One person for Sheriff of the county of Potter.

Two persons for members of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania.

One person for the office of Sheriff for the county of Potter.

Two persons for Associate Judges for the county of Potter.

One person for the office of Treasurer for the county of Potter.

One person for the office of County Surveyor for the county of Potter.

One person for the office of Prosecuting Attorney for the county of Potter.

One person for the office of Coroner for the county of Potter.

One person for the office of County Commissioner of the county of Potter.

One person for the office of Auditor for the county of Potter.
