MISCELLANY. On a recent visit to the U. S. Mint at Philadelphia, we obtained one of the new cents, the issue of which Congress should at once authorize. It is a handsome coin—all but the flying eagle, perhaps—and certainly a very great improvement on the present unwieldy and filthy copper cent. It is about the size of a quarter eagle, but much thicker, and nearly of the color of German silver. The obverse is a well executed figure of an eagle in flight, with the date underneath, and the words "United States of America" above. The reverse is a finely executed wreath, representing all the principal staples of the country—cotton, corn, tobacco, wheat, grapes, etc.—with the words "ONE CENT" in the center. The only objection we hear to it is, it has no ringing sound.

MISCELLANY.
