The Election is past, and its result proves that the work devolved on the Republican Party is no yet complete. In all the Eastern and Northern portions of the country—in New England, New York, Ohio and the Northwest—the Republican banner flies in triumph, while in Southern France, Pennsylvania, Indiana and Illinois—in short, wherever few newspapers are taken, and where common schools are too poor and too feeble to have educated the present generation of voters—the black flag of Slavery obscures the sunshine.

A stranger to America might distinguish these parts of our country from those of the Old Regulator, in the vigor of the Republican Party. We have failed of present success, not because the People are ignorant, but because that large portion who did not hear or read the argument, and do not know what were the real questions at issue, were misled by the great majority of the educated and influential, endeavoring to pronounce.

These facts indicate the path of pressing duty. With no unimpaired feelings over what is irretrievable—with no abatement of heart or hope because the triumph of Liberty in her new order of iron was at the Long Island and White Plains of her struggle—with no shadow of regret as to the responsibility of governing is now confided to her champions before the people, we are determined to do all that we can to sustain the work of diffusing the vital truth which, in regard to the concerns of this world, as well as the next, makes Free indeed.

Now, in the Slave Power's heyday of victory, when its ministers and servile agents are gathering and plotting to make the most of their triumph and crush out the spirit which every day believes to be crucified and embowered when the first-hearted or cold-blooded, who lately based in the sunshine of our premature hopes, are hunting off to repair damages and talking of abandoning the rugged arena of Politics for more quiet and flowery fields—now, in this hour of weariness and shadow, 'Till the Sun'—we must take the way of courage and hostility to every form of tyranny or the bodies or souls of men—to the shameful assumption that the benighted and feeble, whether in soul or body, are to be regarded and treated as the brute or the prey of their wiser or stronger brethren—to the domination of despots or oligarchs, who rule over or oppress the entire vast continents and kingdoms in Europe, or the breeders of children for the auction-block and the cotton-fields in Virginia or Alabama.

The doctrine that no human being was ever created for the benefit or advantage of another, but all service between man and man should be free and reciprocal—that the laborer should not be made to pamper others' pride or minister to others' luxury, but that the honest success of a comfort of those most degraded to a man should be certain triumph. I must, reveal, for God reigns, and Earth was not created to be a theater of injustice, oppression and misery forever. Immortal triumph! for at last, prophecy affirms and the vindication of the Divine benignity, imperative requires it. It is the triumph for Democracy, for the oppressed and the oppressed in the soil of our continent, and the shrine of reforms and liberators, through the Old World. If must triumph; for Man's history is not a chaos of a ridge, but everywhere justice with meaning; and no heroic effort ever failed of its effect—no drop of martyr blood was ever shed in vain.

Even when we Republicans were disposed to forget our duty, our adversaries would not permit it. They are busy to-day in lengthening their cords and strengthening their stakes with a vigilance and activity which reveals a consciousness on their part that their dominion must be made more forthwith, or their searper will be more sorely departed. Today, myriads of the Slave Power's agents, in the form of Central America, and waging a war of extermination on the distressed inhabitants of its perjury Republics, while it by turns leads and scowls at Cuba, while its monstrous hands are precipitated on avowed Kansas, under the protection and smiles of the Federal Administration. Even as we write, the telegraph informs us that the very Free-States men, guilty of a attempt to defend their homes against the rapine and violence of duress and King's blood-hungry vandals, have been conveyed by Lecomp's Court, of manslaughter, and sentenced to five years' imprisonment at hard labor as retribution. This is a fair estimate of what the long passage for 'criminals' in Kansas—justice which takes the criminals into pay and sides them in hanging down, pundering and 'winging out' the innocent, whom it consigns to the State Prison if they are ever gadded into the madness of resisting their oppressors. Such crimes and wrongs are unhappy Hungary or Poland has never endured, even Hungary or Poland has never known, and the power at whose disposal these villainies were and are, per se, are not achieved another four years' ascendancy to the Federal Government. Who, in view of these facts, can say that Republics may now pile their arms, even for an hour!
