Free Exhibition.

Tam O'Shanter was never more "glorious." We need a little infusion of the spirit that is just now active in some of the counties around us, to enforce the law against liquor selling. This thing has been trifled with too long.

Broken bridge.

Monday afternoon Mr. Porter Clark was drawing a saw-log with a yoke of oxen across the bridge over the river on Seventh street, when one of the stringers broke and bridge, oxen, log and man mixed up in the water together. Although the stream at this point is quite deep no serious damage was sustained by either Mr. Clark or his team. He soon extricated himself by climbing up on the timbers of the bridge, and the oxen after being unyoked were easily got out. A few bruises all around were the extent of the injuries.

Murder and Suicide at Alfred.

A terrible tragedy occurred on April 9th in the town of Alfred, Allegany Co., N. Y. We take the substance of the account from the *Sabbath Recorder* of the 17th: Alvah B. Carr, son-in-law of Horace G. Witter, went to the house of the latter, where at the time was his wife and a little son about four years old. Taking this boy he went into the woodshed. His wife followed him, and as she opened the door she saw him in the act of striking the boy with an ax. She screamed and fainted. This called other persons to the spot, but they found the child dead with his skull crushed in and his head nearly severed from his body, and the man with his throat cut in so effectual a manner that he died in a few minutes. Domestic and financial troubles were evidently the cause of the horrible deed.

Wellsboro Mail Route.

J. M. Bassett, of Coudersport, has contracted to run this end of the Wellsboro mail route, from here to Brookland. He takes possession of the line on the first of May.

Postmaster M. S. Thompson, who has been seriously sick for a couple of weeks is able to be out again and attend to his business as usual.

to the regular rates of postage. [Hereafter these have been on the "free" list.]

3. Congress passed no law reducing the rate of letter postage. [There is an erroneous idea that the rate of letter postage, on and after July 1, has been reduced to two cents for each one-half ounce of fraction thereof.]

4. Prepayment on newspapers and periodicals, on and after July 1, is not compulsory but optional, as heretofore. The rates are the same whether paid or not.

5. The act of January 9, 1873, requires that all matter of the third class (papers and periodicals not sent regularly; also pamphlets, books, packages of samples, merchandise, seeds, etc.) must be prepaid at the office of mailing, otherwise the same shall not be forwarded; but should the same be forwarded without such prepayment, double the prepaid rate must be collected on delivery. Compulsory prepayment applies only to the third class matter.

6. Letters having one full rate (three cents) prepaid must be forwarded as heretofore and shall be charged only with the actual balance not prepaid. [By a decision of the Postmaster-General last year, such letters were subject to double the amount unpaid. This decision was not sustained by the Attorney-General, who was appealed to.]

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Oil Well in McKean.

The McKean *Miner* states that the oil well near the borough of Bradford, which has for a year past been down about 800 feet and produced from two to three barrels of oil a week, was a short time ago sunk 250 feet farther, when the oil commenced flowing with such force that it was thrown to the height of 75 feet above the mouth of the well. It now produces ten barrels of oil daily.
