The act of January 9, 1873, requires that all matter of the third class (papers and periodicals not sent regularly; also and periodicals not sent regularly; also pamphlets, books, packages of samples, merchandise, seeds, etc..) must be prepaid at the office of mailing, otherwise the same shall not be forwarded; but should the same be forwarded without such prepayment, double the prepaid rate must be collected on delivery. Compulsory prepayment applies only to the third class matter.

6. Letters having one full rate (three cents) prepaid must be forwarded as heretofore and shall be charged only with the actual balance not prepaid. [By a decision of the Postmaster-General last year, such letters were subject to double the amount unpaid. This deci-sion was not sustained by the Attorney-General, who was appealed to.]
