INAUGURATION OF GOV. BIGLER.

This interesting ceremony took place at Harrisburg, on Tuesday the 20th instant, in the presence of both Houses of the Legislature, and a large concourse of people.

The Senate convened at a quarter before 12 o'clock, and being waited upon by a committee from the house of Representatives, immediately proceeded to the Hall of the House, for the purpose of taking part in the ceremonies of the inauguration.

Upon the arrival of the procession at the Capitol, the retiring Governor and the Governor elect were introduced to the assemblage and took their seats upon the speaker's platform—the Speaker of the Senate on the extreme right, the Governor elect seated next to him, and the retiring Governor and the Speaker of the House on his left.
