LATER FROM CALIFORNIA.

ARRIVAL OF THE DANIEL WEBSTER. Terrible Fire at San Juan—One-third of the City in Ruins.

The steamer Daniel Webster, Commander Baldwin, arrived at New York at noon yesterday, from San Juan, and brings California dates to January 17th.

The steamer Independence left San Francisco, January 17th, at 4 o'clock, P. M.—36 hours after the U. S. Mail Steamer California. The passengers by the steamers Independence and Daniel Webster have come through, from San Francisco to New York, in the unprecedented short space of 26 days and 10 hours.

The steamer Daniel Webster has experienced heavy weather from Charleston North. She has \$70,000 in gold dust on freight.
