LATER FROM EUROPE.

Boston, October 1st.—P. M. The steamship America, from Liverpool, via Halifax, reached her wharf at East Boston at 1 P. M.

The news has been generally anticipated but the following is the very latest despatch: Paris, Friday evening.—The sudden rise in corn has acted on the funds. The Bank of France, however, has not raised the rate of discount.

The Bourse is dull, and funds of every description have declined. Three closed at 7 3/4; Four and a half per cent. at 10 1/4. London, Sept. 16, Noon.—The excitement in the money market has created much alarm. The discount houses gave notice yesterday of an advance of 1 per cent. on the rate of interest on money at call.

In some instances, it is stated that three quarters will be allowed for money deposited under an agreement for one week. To-day shows less signs of uneasiness. The Times says there is no reason to doubt that Turkey will accept, in substance, the proposed terms, without the recent modifications.

The overland mail has arrived. Despatches from Madrid of the Vexis, from Malta. No news of importance. St. Petersburg, Sept. 6.—The Envoy Extraordinary of Persia, after an interview with the Czar, left to-day without accomplishing the object of his mission.

Fatal Railroad Accident. BALTIMORE, Oct. 1.—The steamer Arctic sailed at noon to-day for Liverpool, with 107 passengers. Among them were the following Philadelphians: J. B. Willbank, G. D. Parrish, J. W. Tibbs, O. Colton and daughter, and J. W. Easter. She took off \$241,000 in specie.

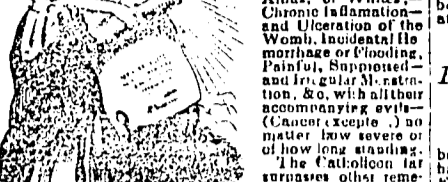
