Further from Europe by the Niagara.

### WAR INEVITABLE.

The royal mail steamship Niagara, Capt. Leitch, from Liverpool, on Saturday, 15th inst., arrived at Halifax on the 26th inst., at midnight, bringing 145 through passengers.

The Collins steamship Arctic, from New York on the 1st inst., arrived out on Wednesday, 12th.

**THE EASTERN QUESTIONS.**—The news is brief, but important and warlike.

The Sultan has appealed to the moral, and, if necessary, to the materials of France and England, by demanding the presence of their fleets before Constantinople.

A Trieste letter, of the 12th inst., says the declaration of war was published in all the imperial manifesto, and was posted on the walls of the mosques.

Omar Pasha on the 9th inst., formerly summoned Gortschakoff to evacuate the Ottoman territory. If Gortschakoff refers to his government, Omar Pasha will allow fifteen days, but Russia definitely refuses he will commence hostilities at once, but, in the meantime, will not cross the Danube. This would delay operations till the 24th October.

A corps of 150,000 additional Turkish troops had been ordered.

The navigation of the Danube and Black Sea is guaranteed to neutral flags.

The clergy had offered to place 200,000 piastres of church property at the Sultan's disposal.

The Sultan had represented to the ambassadors of the foreign governments that he desired to settle the difficulties with Russia peaceably; but as his ancestors had gained their empire by the sword, the Turks would perish in its support; or if fate ordained that their country should fall to another master, they would quit Europe as they entered it—sword in hand.

The opinion is that the French and English will allow the Turks and Russians to fight their own battles, but if the Turks are defeated, will prevent the Russians from marching on Constantinople. With a strong position between Buda, on the Danube, and Kestoped, on the Black Sea, or they might perhaps occupy Rodosto, on the sea of Marmora, or Brestschau.

Neither France or England are arming openly, but the forces of both countries are in a very effective condition.

The Russians on their part are active. General Ljudas had arrived at the capitol. The troops were in motion up the river. Fifteen battalions of infantry, with thirty pieces of artillery, had marched thro' Bucharest. Prince Gortschakoff, it was reported, had in effect annexed the Principalities, having formerly notified the Hespos, that Prince Menschikoff will in future administer the government.

The remaining Russian officials had left

Turkey. Thirty thousand Rediffs, under a French Colonel Magnan, had been pushed forward to the Bosnian frontier, to watch the movements of Prince Daniel of Montenegro, who is again arming.

There was a rumor (but it was disbelieved) that the Porte had appointed Dembinski and Klapka, the Hungarians to high commands.

Conflicting reports were received from Persia. The latest advises say the Shah, acting on the advice of the British minister, had rejected the request of Russia to take arms against the Turks.

**ALLENTOWN RAILROAD.**—The letting of the extension of the Allegheny Valley Railroad, above Kittanning, was attended by a large number of persons. It took place in Kittanning last week. The number of miles let is forty-five. The bids have been opened, and will be announced next week. The contest for the contracts was very warm. It is expected that forty miles of the northern portion of the road will be let next month. This will leave about forty miles of the road to be placed under contract.

The work on the road between this city and Kittanning is being prosecuted with great activity. The hopeful ones anticipate that the cars will be running between Pittsburgh and Kittanning in July, 1854.—*Pittsburg Post.*

On the 3d inst., the Hon. James E. Broome was inaugurated as Governor of Florida. He takes ground for the removal of the Seminole Indians, considering them as a blot to the posterity of the State in violation of their treaty obligations, and in open defiance of the power, authority and importance of the Federal Government. He will consider it a part of his constitutional duty to see the law of last session, providing for their final removal, faithfully executed. He advocates common schools, railroad improvements, and promises his hearty support to Gen. Pierce's administration.

**FAMINE IN THE BIRMAN EMPIRE.**—A terrible famine is said to be prevailing in Rangoon and Prome, in the Birman empire and thousands of men, women and children will perish if not relieved. The prisons were full of people, who committed crimes in order to be imprisoned, so that they might have something to eat. The crops last year entirely failed.
