

REMOVAL OF GREYTOWN.
The shipwreck Prometheus arrived at New York on Monday evening the 24th instant, bringing the intelligence of the destruction of San Juan, or Greytown on the 19th instant by the United States ship-of-war Cyane, commanded by Capt. Hollins, which had arrived at San Juan del Norte on the 11th inst. in twenty-one days from New York commissioned to settle certain difficulties between American citizens and the local authorities.

The authorities and residents of the town refused to make the slightest apology. After giving ample time, any no reply having been received, Captain Hollins on the 12th instant, issued a proclamation to the authorities and residents—that unless an apology was made by 9 A. M., on the 13th, he should, without further notice proceed to bombard the town. No apology came.

On the morning of the 13th the inhabitants of the town left, and took to the woods, leaving all their property behind them.—At 9 o'clock the twenty-four hours having expired, we hauled abreast of the town and opened a fire upon it from our starboard battery and continued for several hours, every shot taking effect; we shot away their flag-staff, and down came the ensign; but the houses being frame we could not do much injury; therefore we ceased firing, and sent a party on shore to burn the town, and in a few hours the whole place was in ruins. San Juan is now one heap of smoking ashes. The authorities have been taught that our government will not allow her ministers to be imprisoned with impunity, and also that the commander of the Cyane is the wrong man to be trifled with.

The H. B. M. schooner Bermuda, the West India Company's Mail steamer Dec, and a British merchantman, were witnesses of the same, laying in the harbor at the time.

The Cyane sails for Boston on the 17th instant, and takes Mr. Fybins our Commercial Agent home. Officers and crew all well.

OREGON TERRITORY.
STATE GOVERNMENT QUESTION.—Sufficient returns have been received to enable us to state that this favorite project of the Durham democracy has been voted down by a large majority of the freemen of Oregon.

INDIAN AFFAIRS.—Gen. Palmer, the Superintendent of Indian affairs of Oregon and Washington, has just returned from a visit of two months among the Indians. He informs us that he succeeded in getting all the Indians in the Rogue river vicinity to go on to the reserves under the treaty, with the exception of the Tipsey's band. From Deer Creek and Illinois river the Indians have all removed, and there is now no tribe or band between Jacksonville and Crescent City. He found the Indians on the coast rather quiet. On the Coquille river, however, there had been some disturbance, in which ten whites and several Indians were killed. The real murderers were afterwards found, and after trial hung. He left Mr. Parish, Indian agent, with his party, at Port Oxford. He met two hundred Port Oxford Indians in council. The Chief complained that the whites ill-treated their women, by coming about their lodges in the night, and in case of denial would threaten to shoot them.—At Gen. Palmer's request, Gen. Wool has detached twenty-four men for Port Oxford to keep the rowdies quiet. He thinks the number of Indians in the Port Oxford district does not exceed 2,000.

LIEUT. MULLEN AND PARTY SAFE.—A rumor was put in circulation that Lieutenant Mullen and party, who were engaged in the Northern Pacific Railroad exploration, had been killed by the Blackfoot Indians. We are glad to be able to state that the rumor is without foundation.

WASHINGTON TERRITORY.
The columns of the Pioneer and Democrat are entirely filled with the laws of the Territory, and the names of officers appointed to serve until the first general election.

EXCITEMENT AT BELLINGHAM BAY.—By the brig Tarquina, which arrived on the 9th of June from Puget's Sound, we have received the following:
It was understood at Whiteby's Island that the people of Bellingham Bay were thrown into considerable excitement, owing to an anticipated attack from a body of Queen Charlotte's Island Indians, and a call had been made upon the acting Governor for troops to sustain them in their defence. The son of one of the head chiefs of that tribe had been recently killed by a white man near Olympia, and the attack was for the purpose of revenge. These Indians are really brave, and are much superior in intelligence to any upon the north-western coast.

It was also stated that upon the San Juan (Believe) Island an armed body of seventy-five of these Indians had been placed by Governor Douglas of Vancouver's Island, to prevent the seizure of sheep belonging to the Hudson Bay Company, by the U. S. Collector. This is one of the disputed Islands, and some clashing of authority between the officials of the two governments had recently occurred, since which time Governor Douglas had made an attempt to arrest the U. S. Inspector.—The Collector, Col. Eby, was absent on a visit to the Island, and when the Tarquina sailed was daily expected to return. It seems very evident by a glance at the published maps, that the main channel between Vancouver's Island and the main land runs through the Straits of Haro, thus throwing San Juan Island into American Territory. It is estimated that the Hudson Bay Company have here 3000 sheep in pasture at this time.

The Insurrection in Spain.
WASHINGTON, July 28.—Intelligence has been received here by the Africa, from responsible sources, stating that the insurrection in Spain was spreading in all directions.

Resolutions Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

SECTION 1. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be made to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, and in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:

PROPOSITION 1, TO BE ARTICLE XI.
SECTION 1. The aggregate amount of debts hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in case of war, to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which the debt may be contracted, or to pay such debts, and to no other purpose.

SECTION 2. To pay the public debt of the Commonwealth, and debts which may hereafter be contracted, in case of war, to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, and to redeem the public debt, the Legislature shall at their next session after the adoption of this section into the Constitution, provide by law for the creation of a sinking fund, which shall not be abolished till the said public debt and interest thereon, be paid in full, to consist of all the net annual income from all public works and establishments by the Commonwealth, or any other funds arising under any revenue law now existing or that may be hereafter enacted, so far as the same may be required to pay the interest of said debts semi-annually, and annually to reduce the principal thereof, by a sum not less than five hundred thousand dollars, increased yearly by compounding at a rate of not less than five per centum per annum; the said sinking fund shall be invested in the loans of the Commonwealth, which shall be cancelled from time to time in a manner to be provided by law, and the payment of the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this article, but the said sinking fund shall be applied only to the purpose herein specified.

SECTION 3. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any way be given or loaned to or in aid of any individual, company, corporation or association, but the Commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder in any company, association or corporation in this Commonwealth or elsewhere, formed for any purpose.

SECTION 4. The Commonwealth shall never assume the debts of any county, city, borough or township, or of any corporation or association, unless such debts have been contracted to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to defend the State in war.

PROPOSITION 2, TO BE ARTICLE XI.
Prohibiting Municipal Legislatures.
The Legislature shall never authorize any county, city, borough or township, by vote of its citizens or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any joint stock company, association or corporation, or in any such company, association or corporation, or in aid of any such company, association or corporation.
