THE LATE CONTEST.

The returns of the late election render the success of Pollock certain. We would, under any circumstances, regret a triumph of Whig principles; but the mortification is doubly great, and must be to every American citizen, when he contemplates the means resorted to for the purpose of procuring the result.
