

Ten Days Later From Europe.
ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICA AT HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, Dec. 23.—The royal mail ship America, Capt. Lang, from Liverpool on Saturday, 9th inst., arrived this port this afternoon for Boston.

Her advices are ten days hence to be received by the Pacific.

The Collins steamship Atlantic arrived at 11 A. M., on the 6th inst.

The screw steamer Sarah Sand sailed from Liverpool for Portland on the 5th inst., and the Washington left Southampton for New York on the 6th. The latter has two hundred passengers, and a cargo valued at £600,000 sterling.

The news although devoid of anything exciting from the seat of war, is of the greatest importance, inasmuch as it is announced that the most important negotiations were in progress, and that Austria had signed a treaty of alliance with France and England.

Nothing of consequence has transpired before Sebastopol.

There is no news whatever of importance from the seat of war. Frequent reports are recorded, and the Russians were generally repulsed without much damage on either side. The allies were continually receiving reinforcements, and were mainly engaged in strengthening their positions.

The main interest of the news is centered in the negotiations, which had become complicated, and of vast importance. A treaty of alliance between Austria, France and England, was signed at Vienna on the 21st inst.—binding it is supposed—Austria to declare war against Russia within one month, and England and France to guarantee Austria against invasion or insurrection.

Austria calls on the German States to support her with federal troops—but Russian influence is at work in opposition to this. Commercial letters assert that Austria entered into this treaty unwillingly, but consented to it in preference to breaking entirely with the Western powers.

Nesselrode has published a letter defining the four terms on which Russia will accept peace; namely; A joint protectorate of the five Powers over the Christians in Turkey; a like protectorate over the Principalities, subject to existing Russian treaties; the revision of the treaty of 1841 to which Russia will accept if the Sultan will; and the free navigation of the Danube.

Prussia and all the German States were hastily putting all their armies on a war footing.

It is said that Omer Pasha, with 40,000 troops, is about to embark for the Crimea.

Admiral Hamelin had resigned the command of the French squadron in the Black Sea and returned to France.

The remainder of the French troops in Greece have been ordered to the Crimea.

A proposition for the augmentation of the British Army to the extent of 35,000 is to be submitted to Parliament.

The Spanish Chambers have decided to support the present dynasty. The ministry resigned upon some trifling financial defeat, but consented to resume office.

The latest intelligence, however, is to the effect that the crisis continued, and that Espartero had advised the Queen to send for Madoz and Olesazo to form a cabinet.

Mr. Soule had arrived at Madrid.

LATER FROM CALIFORNIA. ARRIVAL OF THE GEORGE LAW.

The pilot-boat Dancing Feather had returned from the wreck of the Yankee Blade, having succeeded in recovering four boxes of treasure, containing \$70,000.

From Los Angeles we learn that two Sonorians, having had a difficulty to settle, resolved to appeal to arms, and having appointed a place of meeting, were proceeding on their way thither, when one of the parties, thinking to have the first chance, fled at his intended antagonist and shot him through the head. The culprit was pursued by a posse, but effected his escape. What is most surprising, the wounded man, although shot completely through the forehead, is recovering.

Three Indians, who murdered Mr. A. Flush, were hung at Crescent City, on the 20th ult. They were tried by a people's jury.

From Oregon we learn that gold has been discovered on the Willamette river, some seven or eight miles above Salem. It is found in particles and quartz.

From Los Angeles we have rumors of another filibustering expedition, having for its object the overthrow of Melendez in Lower California, and that men and money are being raised for the purpose.

It is reported that Big Camp, Calaveras county, has become the head-quarters of a band of Mexican banditti, from which they issue out at night and commit every kind of depredation.

A serious affray with Indians has recently taken place. A party of seven persons was travelling from Salt Lake to California, when they were attacked on the Humboldt river, by the Indians. The savages were lying in ambuscade, and were armed with rifles. They fired upon the party and killed five; the other two escaped.

The only occurrence of moment noticed by the San Francisco papers was the issuing by Judge Norton of a writ of habeas corpus, directed to the officers in command of the Russian prize ship Sitka, lately captured by the allied fleet of Petropavlovsk, and then lying in the harbor of San Francisco, and commanding them to produce before the court the persons of two Russians held in confinement as prisoners of war, to await the judgment of that tribunal in the premises. The sequel of the story is thus told by the Alta Californian:

"About ten o'clock on Sunday morning the Sitka weighed her anchors, and, escorted by the launch of her Britannic Majesty's brig President, put to sea, without heeding the writ which had been served upon her officers. On the opening of the Court on Monday morning, Mr. Randolph introduced evidence showing the fact that the officers of the Sitka had departed without making return to the writ, and at his instance the court issued a certificate setting forth these facts, which it was intimated would be forwarded to the proper department at Washington, for such action as the government might think proper in the premises."
