HEAVY EMBROIDERY SUIT.—We mention the other day that an embroidery suit had been brought against the Illinois Central Railroad, to recover property valued at \$2,000,000, at the mouth of the river in Chicago, occupied by the company for depot purposes. We find the following history of the claim and of the defence in the Milwaukee Wisconsin.

George C. Bates, the plaintiff, claims that the Kinzie family owned in 1804, the north half of section 10, of which the sand bar that formed the nucleus of the grounds built upon by the company, was a part. The sand bar was held by John Kinzie till 1812, when the fort at that point was evacuated by order of Gen. Hull, and burnt by the Indians. By this event the Kinzie family were forced from their possession.

In 1816, the fort was rebuilt, and John Kinzie again took possession of the sand bar. In 1830, Robert Kinzie, John's son, preempted it in the land office, Palestine, Ill. It continued in the family and with the grantee of Robert Kinzie, until Mr. Bates obtained it; and he was dispossessed by the railroad company. The points of defence are:

1. Kinzie obtained no title to the sand bar, even if he got the title to the north fraction of section 10 in 1830, the sand bar not being a fraction by the government survey.

2. His title did not accrue until 1830, after the mouth of the river, by the operation of the government piers, was permanently fixed where it now is.

3. The sand bar was washed away, so that in law, it had become the bed of the lake, and the property of the sovereign, with no right of reclamation whatever.
