OS A VISIT.—Clark Wilson Esq. formerly one of the Editors of this paper, and the present Editor of the *Democratic Messenger*, published in Indiana Pa. is now on a visit to our town. SHERIFF.—J. R. REED Esq. who has filled the office of Sheriff of this county for the last three years to the entire satisfaction of her citizens, retires from the office this week, and F. G. Miller Esq. elected at the general election in October last, assumes the duties and responsibilities of the office. For the retiring officer we can cheerfully say that his official career has been marked by an upright and faithful discharge of his duties in all his relations to the public; and for his successor, that he has an example worthy of imitation, and he need seek no higher praise at the close of his term, than that he made as faithful a sheriff as Mr. Reed. COURT.—The regular term of November Court is now in session, and the usual number of people have been in attendance since its commencement, notwithstanding the court last week. A large amount of criminal business has occupied the attention of the court since Monday. A few civil causes however been tried.

SINGULAR INCIDENT.—On Wednesday evening of this week, Mr. Terence Behan, of Lawrence township, was standing in the Court House during the evening session, he suddenly fell to the floor, apparently lifeless. He was immediately taken to the "Mansion House" and a physician called, but it was some time before animation was restored. We saw Mr. B. the same evening, shortly after his recovery, and he informed us that he felt as well as usual both before and after his sudden illness and knew nothing of the incidents of it, except as they had been related to him by others.

NEW COURT HOUSE.—The Grand Jury this week, upon the recommendation of the Court, concurred with the report of a former Grand Jury favourably to the erection of a new Court House.

This is an excellent move, as no convenience is more needed at the county seat for the accommodation of persons attending Court than a building commodious enough to contain and seat everybody comfortably, where they can witness the progress of their cause, without crowding within the bar and around and upon the council table.

We hope to see it completed at an early day.
