# A gricultural

STARTING SEEDS EVELY .- As the season for gardening is coming on apace, some of our readers, who have a patch wherein to ultivate their own vegetables, may find the following suggestion of advantage: ]

Rev. Daniel Emerson, Summit County, Ohio, writes that he has been successful in giving garden seeds an early start in the following manner. Having selected the quantity needed, each sort is tied by itself n a clotu, the name being plainly written on a slip af paper, and enclosed with the seed. The packages are then buried about two inches deep in the ground for a week or two. When ready to plant, the kinds needed for planting are taken from the bag and used. They will be found to have swelled, perhaps sprouted, and ready to grow. If the ground should be quite dry, it is best to water the drills after dropping the seed, and then cover with dry earth. Mr. E. says that by this plan he has never failed to raise plants from every seed planted, though when put out the; were often sprouted. If each seed is placed where it is wanted to grow, it will save labor of thinning, though mamy prefer to thin their rows, leaving the most prominent plants to grow.

Sowing Oats in March.-The following suggestions, although too late for March, will answer equally as well for April, for those farmers who have not yet sown their

"Three of us—neighbors—concluded we would sow our oats last spring as early as the latter part of the third month (March.) on stubble without plowing, and depend upon a thorough harrowing to cover it.-We did so, and the result was a good crop. of grain on beautiful, bright straw.
