DIVINE SERVICE.

By divine permission the Rev. T. R. Fugit of York county will preach in Clearfield Town in the Lutheran Church, on the first day of May next, at half past 10 o'clock in the morning, and at 3 o'clock in the afternoon in the Baptist Church in Curwensville, and on Monday evening the 2d at early candle-light in Luthersburg, and on Friday the 3d in the evening in Millport.

COURT.—The time of our courts having been changed, no Jury Court will be held on the third Monday of May next, as formerly, but the court will be in session for the transaction of all such business as may be disposed of without the intervention of a jury. A court will be held in June for the trial of civil suits; and the next court afterwards will come in September following. This will be a general Court of Quarter Sessions, Common Pleas, and Orphans' Court, &c., &c.

IN LIMBO.—The Street preacher, known as "old seven day," who has been illuminating our borough with his lectures for some time, was invited to lodge in the Stone Hotel on Market St. on last Monday night, as a mark of the estimation in which his oratorical efforts are held by the community. STORM.—A heavy snow storm passed over this section of the State last Saturday raving with great violence. The snow fell to the depth of several inches, and a great deal of timber was blown down.—east of the Alleghenies the storm was equally as violent as here, but the snow mingled with rain and sleet and melted as it fell. Many of the highways were blocked by the fallen trees, and the mail coach had great difficulty in reaching Philipsburg through the storm.

RAFTING.—The late fall of snow, which was as suddenly as it came, has raised the water to a very high flood, and our lumbermen are as actively engaged in rafting as they have been at any time during the season. The quantity of timber to run is not very great, but will now be carried to market with the greatest expedition.

CLEARFIELD CREEK.—This stream is now in excellent rafting order and a considerable number of rafts have already been run out of it. The logs having gone out on previous floods, the navigation is unobstructed, and the advantage is very evident in the number of rafts which have been safely run out.

IN A VOYAGE.—"Old Sevenday," after his visit to the stone mansion had been concluded, embarked on board a raft upon his voyage down the Susquehanna, doubtless after the manner of Heckwelder, for the purpose of converting the heathen along its shores.
