**THE CENSUS.**—Mr. J. G. **ROBBERY AND MURDER.**—On Sunday the 1st inst., the house of Thomas Stewart, of Toby township, Clarion county, was entered and robbed of about \$80. The same night Jared Lewis and Eli McCall, entered the persons suspected, one of whom drew a revolver, and fired instantly killing Lewis and wounding McCall. The robbers then escaped, and for whom a reward of \$800 is offered.
