Durability of Posts

A CORRESPONDENT OF THE NEW ENGLAND FARMER reports an experiment on the durability of posts, which were arranged and conducted. The timber used was "Yellow oak," it was cut in winter, and each log was large enough to split into two bar-posts, which were set the following spring:

1st PAIR—Butt end down, one charred. Both rotted off the third year; the upper ends were then put in the ground, and they lasted seven years more.

2d PAIR—Butt end down, and salted by boring and plugging. Salted post gave out the second year; the unsalted the fourth year. The ends were then reversed, and each lasted about eight years longer.

3d PAIR—One butt down, the other butt up. The butt rotted off the third year, the other the fourth. The ends were reversed, and the new butt rotted before the other, although the latter was set one year the soonest.

4th PAIR—Small ends down, one sited. Both rotted off the fourth year, and being reversed, lasted four years more.

It will be seen that the charring did no good, and salting a green post is useless if not injurious. All the experiments indicate decidedly that posts set reversed last longest; and it appears that seasoned posts last longer than green—the seasoned small ends in the first experiment lasting about twice as long as the green small ends in the fourth.—COUNTRY GENTLEMEN.

COLIC IN HORSES.—Colic in horses is a very common disease, and if taken in time may be easily cured in most cases. It is not unfrequently confounded with inflammation of the bowels, but is easily distinguished as follows: Colic has no increase of the pulse, which is not over fifty a minute; the animal often rolls; the disease intermits, and there is but little fever. Which inflammation of the bowels there is much fever; the pulse is sometimes a hundred a minute, the attack is gradual, and the disease does not intermit.

When colic arises from bad food, a pint or so of a solution of saleratus will often afford entire relief. As it assumes more of a spasmodic character, peppermint and ginger may be added. We have used with entire and immediate success a small spoonful of saleratus, the same quantity of ginger, and a teaspoonful of peppermint, added to a pint of nearly boiling hot water, and given from a junk bottle. Powdered charcoal is one of the best and safest medicines for any disease resulting from derangement of digestion—and two or three ounces or more mixed with water, may be given at any time with great advantage.

Inflammation of the bowels is generally increased by irritating medicines. A drink of slippery elm hourly, and giving the horse but little food, and letting him rest, is safe treatment.—Exchange.

LIQUID GLUE.—The following receipt, the discovery of a French chemist, is selling about the country as a secret, for various prices, from one to five dollars. It is a handy and valuable composition, as it does not gelatinize nor undergo putrefaction and fermentation and become offensive, and is always ready for use:

In a wide-mouthed bottle dissolve eight ounces of best glue in a half pint of water, by setting it in a vessel of water and heating it till dissolved.—Then add slowly, constantly stirring, two and a half ounces strong aquafortis, (nitric acid.) Keep it well corked, and it will be ready for use.

VIRILITY IN HORSES.—Some experiments have recently been made in France by persons skilled in the veterinary art, with a view of ascertaining how long horses may live without food in certain contingencies, as, for example, being shut up in besieged places. The following results have been noted: A horse may live twenty-five days without solid food, and merely drinking water. He may live seventeen days without eating or drinking. He can live only five days when consuming solid food without drinking. After taking solid aliment for the space of ten days, but with an insufficient quantity of drink, the stomach is worn out. The above facts show the importance of water in the sustenance of the horse, and the desire the animal must feel to be supplied with it. A horse which had been deprived of water for three days, drank eleven gallons in the space of three minutes.

TO CATCH OWLS.—Fasten a board just the size of a steel trap upon the end of a long pole. Then bind the trap fast, so that the owl can not light upon it without touching the trench. Set it up so that it will be higher than any object near it. As the owl always alights before it takes it prey, it is sure to light upon it.—OLIVER JESSUP, IOWA.

SWEET POTATO COFFEE.—Mrs. Ann Hoopes, Vermillion Co., Ill., writes that a very good substitute for coffee can be made from sweet potatoes. Wash and scrape good sound tubers, cut them into pieces, half an inch long; dry them in the stove; roast them as you would coffee, until of a light brown color; make coffee from them in usual manner, except that the pieces are not to be ground.
