ARTICLE 1.—Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; OR ABRIDGING THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH, OR OF THE PRESS; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and le petition the Govemment for a redress of grievances. - Constitution of United States.

ARTICLE 9-Secrees 7 .- That the printing presses shall be free to every person who undertakes to examine the proceedings of the legislature, or any branch of government; and no law shall ever be made to restrain the right thereof. The free communication of thoughts and opinions s one of the invaluable rights of man; and every citizen may freely speak, write and print on any subject; being responsible for the abuse of that fiberty. In prosecutions for the publication of papers investigating the official conduct of offi-ers, or men in public capacity, or where the matter published is proper for public informa-tion, the truth thereof may be given in evidence; and in all indictments for libels, the jury shall have a right to determine the law and the facts, under the direction of the court, as ir other cases.
