William F. Johnson, Esq.

The Referees Journal of the 21st of August containing an affidavit made before Hon. Wm. L. Moore, by a couple of young men named Derrick and George, setting forth that the above named gentleman offered them severally five dollars if they would not go to the rendezvous after they had enlisted in the service of their country. This affidavit was prefaced by a few editorial remarks, meanly insinuating that a certain volunteer company (West Branch Grays) failed to fill its ranks at the time appointed, by reason of having "met with all sorts of obstacles and difficulties" from "certain individuals not a thousand miles away"—plainly referring to such Democrats as Wm. F. Johnson. We have no idea that this affidavit was made for the purpose of instituting legal proceedings against Mr. Johnson—as should be done, if he was guilty—but merely to give color to the base imputations of the editorial remarks, which were predicated upon the broad ground that, to be a Democrat, is to be a secessionist and a rebel. No person knowing Mr. Johnson would for a moment doubt either his honor, loyalty, or his patriotism. But as soon as he heard of this charge he called upon the person who was present at the time the tribe was alleged to have been offered, who makes the affidavit embraced in the following communication from Mr. Johnson to the editor of the Journal.

It is proper that we should here add, that Mr. J.'s communication was handed to Mr. Row on Monday evening of last week, for publication in his paper of the coming Wednesday. The paper appeared—but not the communication—but instead, a statement that it was "crowded out." With how much truth this assertion is made, the public can judge from the length of the document—the date at which it was handed in—the contents of the Journal last week—the importance of character of the request—and the view of Mr. Row, Esq., (who was especially active in the swearing of the young men) to Pennville on Tuesday, the day after the communication was handed to Mr. Row, and the day before the paper was published.

The Position of England.

POSSIBLE RECOGNITION OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES.—The correspondent of the New York Tribune writes from Washington under date of August 27th, as follows: Mr. Adams, minister at St. James writes that in the British mind the independence of the rebels is fully admitted as a military and political necessity; that their acknowledgement by England is but a question of time and prudent courtesy. That while Britain is impatient to get cotton from the South in exchange for manufactured goods, she is anxious not to lose Northern markets, and is unwilling to part with her hope of breaking down the Morrill tariff by the same means with which she chained the North by the Walker tariff; and that two or three more successes like that of Bull Run would entitle the slaveocracy to immediate recognition.

The Tribune, in an editorial comment on the above, remarks: "Advices from our Minister in London indicate a certain if not speedy recognition of the 'Confederate States' as an independent power by the British government. But there is in this nothing to surprise or discourage. The tendencies of the British government have not been a secret. The success or failure of the Jeff Davis rebellion depends on its power at home, not on the favor with which it may be regarded abroad. A recognition by Great Britain would doubtless give it a certain degree of moral support, but would neither feed nor clothe its armies. Wait a little, and we may have news to send abroad that will neutralize the influences of that on which the British Ministry is now disposed to act. We expect no favor from Europe, and have sought none."

The Tribune has the foregoing news "exclusively." No other of the "sensational papers" of New York have a word of it.

[The Washington Republican, of a subsequent date, spoils the above "sensational" story of the Tribune by denouncing it as totally untrue.—Els. Repub.]
