Capital has its rights, which are as worthy of protection as any other rights. Nor is it denied that there is and probably always will be a relation tetween efits. The error is in assuming, that the half hour? whole labor of the community exists within that relation.

A few men own capital, and that few avoid labor themselves, and with their capital hire or buy another few to labor for tnem. A large majority belong to neither class-neither work for others nor have others working for them.

In most of the Southern States a majority of the whole people, of all colors, are neither slaves nor masters, while in the Northern a large majority are neither hired nor hirers.


