THE NEWS Our limited space again forbids a detailed account of the news from the several divisions of our armies.

The Confederates in front of Gen. McClellan have fallen back to Richmond, where, from the most reliable indications, a vigorous defence will be made.

Gen. McDowell is still in the vicinity of Fredericksburg, with the enemy strongly in force in front of him.

From Gen. Fremont's Department, we learn that the town of Princeton, Mercer county, in southwestern Virginia, where the advance of Gen. Cox's force was stationed was attacked and captured by a part of Humphrey Marshall's rebel force, on the 15th, but that the place was recaptured on the 17th. No particulars are given.

No change has yet taken place at Fort Wright. Our mortar boats are still there, but most of our gunboats were sent up the Tennessee to Pittsburg Landing—to which point all the available forces in the West seem to be concentrating.

We have nothing late from New Orleans, where, at last accounts, all was quiet, but very little of Union feeling had shown itself, as was demonstrated by the failure of Gen. Butler to get any of the papers of that city to publish his proclamation to the people.

From Gen. Hunter's division at Hilton Head S. C.—he who has proclaimed "impartial freedom" to the slaves of his District—we only learn that he was busily engaged in trying to organize a Black regiment—but without much success.

From Washington, we have the remarkable announcement that President Lincoln has finally decided that that clause of our Constitution, and the act of Congress made in pursuance thereof, requiring the rendition of fugitive slaves—shall be executed in the District of Columbia; and that the result is that quite a number of escaped slaves from Maryland are being returned to their masters, thro' the vigilance of the U. S. Marshal.

The President is said to be in sore trouble about Hunter's emancipation proclamation—declaring that Hunter had no authority to issue proclamations, and least of all, such an one; but whether to pass it over, or serve him as Fremont was served, was not so easily determined.

P. S. By last night's mail, we received President Lincoln's Proclamation repealing the proclamation of Gen. Hunter as unconstitutional and of no validity or effect.
