

Bible Meeting

The Clearfield county Bible Society will hold a meeting in the court house on Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Democratic State Convention. M., to nominate candidates for Auditor General and Surveyor General, and to adopt such measures as may be deemed necessary for the welfare of the Democratic party and the country.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY MEETING. The Democrats of Clearfield county are requested to meet in mass Convention, in the Court house, in the borough of Clearfield, on Tuesday evening 17th June, at early candle-light, for the purpose of taking action in relation to the election of delegates to the State Convention to be held at Harrisburg on the 4th July next.

THE KILLED AND WOUNDED.—We have heard the names of several citizens of this county among the killed and wounded in the late battle at Richmond, among others Wellington Johnston and his brother Gratz, are reported killed, and Joseph Shoxer severely wounded.

DESTRUCTIVE FRESHETS.—The rains of last week seem to have extended over an unprecedented extent of country, reaching from sources of the Delaware, in the North to the James river in the South—doing much damage in several localities.

THE DELAWARE WAS EXCEEDINGLY HIGH, DOING much damage to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad as to stop travel for several days.

THE LEHIGH VALLEY suffered much to be estimated at ten millions of dollars—destroying the canal, and carrying off several railroad bridges, and many houses, and several lives are reported lost.

THE SUSQUEHANNA was also very high at Harrisburg, and several rafts are reported as gone adrift from Middletown—having been swept out of the Swatara.

THE POTOMAC was also high, carrying away for the fourth time within one year, the Baltimore and Ohio railroad bridge at Harpers Ferry.
