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DEATH OF JUDGE BONSAI.—Judge Bonsey, late an associate Judge of this county, died at his residence in Brady township, on last Monday evening, aged upwards of 70 years. He has been in declining health for some months, and the sad event of his death was not altogether unexpected.

Losses of the Eighty-Fourth Regiment.

The following is the correct list of the killed wounded and missing of the 84th regiment, P. V., in the late affair at Port Republic, N.J.

Company A—Patrick Burns, killed; Anthony Corr and Wm. H. Lowe, missing; Thomas Coats, wounded.

Company B—Corporal John Snadden, missing.

Company C—Privates James B. Arbel and John Harding, killed; Sergeant A. G. Thornton, wounded slightly; Private C. C. Menell, missing.

Company D—Privates Silas J. Barr and William Taylor, wounded.

Company E—John F. Walsh, wounded; Daniel Bittler, William E. Stead, Adam Sides and Elias Sones, missing.

Company G—Alfred Waters, killed; Warren Post and Samuel Drew, missing.

Company I (Kirby's)—Thomas Adams and John H. Ferguson, wounded.

Company K (Ogden's)—Henry Birmingham, H. E. Kyler and Henry C. Owens, wounded—the latter dangerously; Corporal Daniel Graham and private James McGuire missing.

Appointments by the Governor.

Col. Samuel M. Bowman, to be Colonel of the 84th Regiment, P. V., in place of Col. T. C. McDowell, resigned.—Maj. Barrett has been promoted to the Lieutenant Colonel on the recommendation of the officers of the regiment for brave and gallant conduct while in command of the regiment at the desperate battle at Fort Republic.

Ajutant Thomas H. Craig to be Major of the 84th Regiment, P. V., in place of Major Barrett, promoted. The promotion of Ajutant Craig was well deserved—he was promoted by his regiment.

He is a brave, fearless and accomplished young officer, who distinguished himself at Fort Republic.

By the above announcement it is evident that the glorious Eighty-Fourth is not to be disbanded as was rumored. Report says that it is now reduced to about 200 fit for service. We understand it is to be quartered at Washington, until recruited to the full number.

We have dates from Richmond up to Saturday 21st inst. Skirmishing was of daily occurrence, but without serious results on either side. The last dispatch from then McBellian, dated 21st, is in these words: "Things are pretty quiet today. There is not as much shelling as usual. Our preparations are progressing well. The enemy opened with some heavy guns yesterday, but did no harm."

The advice from the valley of the Shenandoah continue perplexingly indefinite. We had a report that Gen. Shields had fallen back to Strasburg from Luray, and that the latter place was immediately occupied by a large rebel force under Gen. Ewell; and that Fremont, having fallen back to Mount Jackson, had advanced to a pass in the mountains to intercept the advance of the enemy. This, however, is not confirmed by later advices, so that the real situation of affairs in the Valley is still in doubt.

Bonregard, one report says, is at Okolona, Miss., 80,000 strong. Gen. Kirby Smith, with 20,000, was at Chattanooga, Tenn., Gen. Price, with 15,000, at Fulton, and Gen. Van Dorn, with a small force of Cavalry, at Grenada, Miss.

An expedition composed of several gun-boats and two regiments of Indiana volunteers, was sent up the White river some days since, into Arkansas. On the 17th the expedition reached St. Charles, 85 miles from the mouth, where the rebels had erected fortifications. The gun-boats engaged the battery, and the troops were landed to attack the rebels in the rear. During the cannonading a ball entered the boiler of the Mound City gun-boat, causing a fearful explosion. The crew consisted of 175 men, of whom only about 50 escaped. The battery was taken by the land force, capturing some 30 prisoners, and killing and wounding 125 rebels.

Col. Ellet, who commanded the fleet at the capture of Memphis, died on the 21st inst., at Cairo, of wounds received at the bombardment of Memphis.

POSTSCRIPT.—Last night's mail contains nothing important. Passengers say the great battle before Richmond would take place to-day.
