

Lient. Slemp, calling upon Com. Armstrong, obtained the list of men. Thirty names were added to his list six days later, which made his total six days' liability up to number twenty-seven.

In CBH whom this mysterious officer has now held Fort Pickens and performed striking night and day an immense amount of labor in mounting guns, keeping up a strong guard, &c., &c.

Early in January I renewed my lease, seen no indications of a change in interests. Fort Pickens, but a good deal of this was lost in calculations. First, the President thought if an amendment is made by the United States Fort McHenry will probably be occupied, nor Fort Pickens attacked. Then, of movements by the United States, which will doubtless be made known by the press, there will be corresponding local movements, and the attempt to reinforce will be made.

Quantities of "No. 20" and "No. 12" Camp Lay, also "No. 12" of the French, are to a measure to me.

Now it was dangerous whether it would be safe to send reinforcements in an unarmored steamer, and the want, indeed, of suitable naval vessels—the Brooklyn being longed for as a reserve at Norfolk for some purpose unknown to me. Finally, after I had kept a body of three hundred recruits in New York harbor ready for some time—and they would have been sufficient to reinforce temporarily Fort Pickens and to occupy Fort Monroe also—the President about January 18, permitted that the crew of Brooklyn should take a little company, fifty men, from Fort Monroe, Hampton Roads, and reinforce Lieutenant Slemp, in Fort Pickens, but without a surplus man for the neighboring fort Monroe.

The Brooklyn, with Capt. Dodge's company alone, left the Chesapeake for Fort Pickens about January 22, and on the 20th, President Lincoln, having entered into a poor promise, with certain leading secessionists Holt and Tuckey to meet him, in a joint note, the commanders of the war vessel Pensacola and Lieut. Slemp commanding Fort Pickens, to commit no act of hostility, no man and Captain Dodge's company unless that Fort should be attacked.

[That joint note I never saw until March 25th, but supposed the secession was consequent upon the meeting of the Peace Convention at Washington, and was intended to terminate with it.]

Hearing, however, of the most active preparations for hostilities on the part of secessionists at Pensacola, by the erection of new batteries and naming Fort McRae that had not mounted a gun when it was seized—during the Peace Convention and since, I brought the subject to the notice of the new Administration, when this note, dated March 12, in their hands was agreed upon, viz.: "At the first oral moment you will land with your company, reinforce Fort Pickens and hold the same till further orders." This order, in duplicate left New York by two naval vessels about the middle of March, so the mall and the wires could not be substituted, for two had already been arrested and paroled by the authorities of Pensacola, damages taken from one of them, and a third to escape like treatment, forced to turn back when near the city. Thus those authorities have not ceased to make war upon the United States since the capture by them of the Navy Yard, January 14th.

It is known to the Navy Department that the "Loyalty," with Capt. Dodge on board, would be sent in open to stand on or near Fort Pickens, and in rough weather might sometimes be 60 miles off, the fort might have been attacked and easily carried before the reinforcements could have reached the beach, in open sea, where it could land.
