

Religious Miscellany.

INDIVIDUALISM—Every man is individually responsible to God for his actions. He is born apart, he lives apart, and apart he dies; and at the judgment-seat of Christ, for himself he stands or falls. Man is a distinct being, and consequently cannot shift his responsibility. He thinks for himself, chooses for himself, and for himself he acts. Man is swayed by influences; but no matter how great these influences may be which prompt him to action, ever and anon those influences are regarded as his own, and for them he is accountable to Almighty God. Every man has his duties to perform; he cannot shuffle them off upon another, because they are his duties; neither can there be a transfer of conscience, for God holds him individually responsible for their discharge. Between his spirit and the Spirit of his God, no man may, no man can assume responsibility. Man must believe for himself, repent for himself, and for himself will be saved or lost.

SCIENTIFIC FALSHIP.—We ought to prove our doctrines with conclusive arguments; and not merely to address their imaginations and affections; but our reasonings should be deduced from, or founded on, the Word of God; otherwise we shall lose ourselves in empty speculations, or go beyond our depth, by attempting discussions for which we are totally incompetent. But when we are clearly open and explain the Scriptures, and support our conclusions by testimonies of Holy Writ; when we thus evidently lay before men those truths that relate to the person, sufferings, resurrection, and kingdom of Jesus Christ; and then apply such subjects to their hearts and consciences by pathetic addresses; we use the proper means of bringing them to the obedience of faith and may expect to see our labors blessed to many souls.

A SALUTARY THOUGHT.—When I was a young man there lived in our neighborhood a farmer who was usually reported to be a very liberal man, and uncommonly upright in his dealings. When he had any of the produce of his farm to dispose of, he made it an invariable rule to give good measure—rather more than could be required of him. One of his friends observing him frequently doing so, questioned him as to why he did it—told him he gave too much, and said it would be to his disadvantage. Now mark the answer of this excellent man: "God Almighty has permitted me but one journey through the world; and when I am gone, I cannot return to rectify mistakes." Think of this—But one journey through the world!

A PARDONING GOD.—Show me one, if you can; there is no sin-pardoning God besides our God. "Who is a God like unto thee, that pardoneth?"—None can pardon as thou dost. None can pardon so freely, none so fully, none so continually, none so eternally, none so indifferently, [impartially,] whether in respect of sinners or sin, as Thou dost. It is all one to thee what the sins are, so they come to ask thy pardon. And that which is a disadvantage to ask pardon of man, is an encouragement to ask it of God—the greatness of our sins. The Psalmist did, and any man may make this plea: "Lord, pardon mine iniquity, for it is great." Dare any be a competitor with God in this work?

BELIEVE AND LOVE.—Believe and you shall love. Believe much and you shall love much. Labor for strong and deep persuasion of the deep and glorious things which are spoken of Christ, and this will command love. Certainly, did men indeed believe his worth, they would accordingly love him; for the reason he cannot but love that which he firmly believes to be worthiest of affection. Oh! this mischievous unbelief is that which makes the heart cold and dead towards God. Seek, then, to believe Christ's excellency in himself, and his love to us, and our interest in him, and this will kindle such a fire in the heart as will make it ascend in a sacrifice of love to him.

THE SHINING ONES.—It is said that a pure diamond may be easily recognized by putting it under water, when it retains all its brilliancy, while all other precious stones lose their peculiar appearance. Thus it is with the person who is made pure in the water of Jesus. However deep the waters are which overflow his soul, still his light shines, showing the peculiar excellency of the Christian's hope, and the power of divine grace. Of such it may be truly affirmed, "Ye shine as lights in the world, holding forth the word of life."
