Triennial School Convention.

In pursuance of the 43d Section of the Common School Law, passed the 8th day of May A. D. 1851, the School Directors of the several School Districts of Clearfield county, assembled in the Court House in Clearfield on Monday the 4th day of May, A. D., 1863, at 1 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of electing a County Superintendent for the ensuing three years.

The Convention being called to order, on motion of Judge Bloom, ex-Governor Bigler was elected President of the Convention.

On motion of Dr. Boyer, Hon. James Bloom and Miss Irwin were elected Vice Presidents, and A. C. Tate and Dr. Potter were elected Secretaries.

The President of the Convention having read the law in reference to the election of superintendent, the secretaries proceeded to call the roll, when Directors from the following districts answered to their names—

After the calling of the roll was completed, a conversational debate ensued on the question whether the Convention first proposed to fix the salary for the coming term or prior to the election of Superintendent, when Dr. Boyer moved that the salary be fixed at \$800, which was voted.

Mr. McBride, of Conemaugh, then moved that the Convention proceed to the election of County Superintendent, which motion was disagreed to.

Mr. Smith moved that the Convention now proceed to fix the salary. Adopted.

Mr. Smith then moved that the salary be fixed at \$200. Mr. Beck proposed \$900. Mr. Mauck, \$750. Mr. Flegel, \$500.

The question recurring on the highest sum—\$900, was lost, and \$750, was finally fixed on as the yearly salary for the next three years.

The election of County Superintendent being now in order, the following nominations were made.

Dr. Boyer nominated Chas. B. Sandford.

Mr. T. McNeil nominated Jones Rollin.

Mr. Lambert nominated A. T. Schryver.

On motion of Mr. Test the nominations closed. Whereupon the Convention proceeded to vote for Superintendant which resulted as follows:

Sandford 58

Rollin 52

Schryver 4

Total 68

Charles B. Sandford, of Clearfield, having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared duly elected County Superintendent for three years from the first of June next.

After the filling up and signing of the proper certificates by the President and Secretaries, the Convention adjourned sine die.
