So far from being the case, he promises to continue to supply food and clothing as heretofore to such Gen. Hitchcock need not have argued to "lose no time in communicating his letter. No degree of haste would have secured the assent of the Confederate authorities to a proposition so flagrantly unequal.

We are ready to relieve your Government from the burden of supplying food and clothing as heretofore to our people in your hands, and if they are sent to us, yours shall be sent to you, the excess one side or the other to be paid. I hope you will urge on Gen. Hitchcock the acceptance of this proposition as due to the most solemn considerations in the face of the civilized world.

We are content that the "civilized world" should draw its own conclusions when it contrast the two offers.
