SERIOUS FIRE IN BELLEVILLE.—On
Wednesday morning last, about one
o'clock, a fire broke out in one of the
upper rooms of Brockerhoff's Row,
which destroyed the entire block, embrac-
ing the Pennsylvania Hotel, kept
by our friend Copenhafer, who saved
in a manner nothing, Brockerhoff's
store, a Drug and Clothing store, &c.
The flames then crossed the street to
the Arcade, which was entirely con-
sumed, embracing Derr's store, one
residence, and several shops, offices,
&c., including the Banking House of
W. F. Reynolds—the owner. The
estimated loss ranges from \$50,000 to
\$75,000—Brockerhoff and Reynolds be-
ing the principal sufferers.

A Chance for the "Loyal"
Out of personal respect to Gen. HAN-
