ASSASSIN FIRE.—The residence of John Welch, in Pike township, was entirely destroyed by fire on Friday last. Nothing was saved except about half a dozen chairs. About \$100 in money was also destroyed. Total loss \$1500.

THE FIGHT BETWEEN THE CHASSAND LINDSAI FAMILIES, which is just now in progress, suggests the question, "Is it desirable to have a Government?" We do not forget, nor are we likely to do so soon, that it is a very few months since many of those who are now foremost in their support of Chase, and loudest in their denunciation of Lincoln, would seem to differ from the Administration as "traitors" and all who opposed the Administration as "hostile to the Government."

CONVICTION OF GAINES.—The whole two weeks term of our Court was occupied in the trial of Wm. GAINES for the murder of his brother Bonker. The prosecution was conducted with great ability by Messrs. Lipp, District Attorney, Maffett and Ball, and the defence was conducted with ability by Messrs. Oakes, M. Anderson and Pratt. Judge Lipp delivered his charge on Saturday afternoon last. The jury retired about 6 o'clock p. m., and returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree on Sunday morning, at 8 o'clock a. m. On Monday morning a motion was made for a new trial. The argument on this motion will be heard on the 5th of April next.

SOLDIERS RIOT AT FLMIRA.—Early, Feb. 15.—A serious riot occurred here on the 15th. The First Michigan cavalry were on duty on this morning on their way to Washington, and some fifty or sixty of them commenced a riot on various parts and villages. About 1 o'clock a party assembled a number of the Tenth N. York Cavalry. A patrol from the First Corps attempted to arrest the rioters, a serious melee ensued, in which guns, sabres, and bayonets were freely used. One member of the Michigan regiment was shot dead, and another was mortally wounded by a bayonet thrust. A member of the Cavalry corps was badly wounded, and several others were more or less hurt and wounded. Colonel Farnsworth of the Invalid Corps, finally came up with his regiment, and through his exertions, and those of Colonel Eastman and other officers, the disturbance was quelled. Most of the ringleaders were arrested and lodged in the guard-house. The bars were all closed and quiet was soon restored.

THE LEGITIMATE RESULT.—The Administration in its Avowed efforts to elevate the character of the African race and equate them with the white people, ten years ago, benevolently sent from Massachusetts to Port Royal, South Carolina, at the expense of the whole people of the United States, a few hundred spindles to employ, divide and refine all the outcasts at that place. The New Hampshire Patriot of the 4th of October, gives the result of this very benevolent experiment of Mr. Lincoln in the following paragraph:—*Lowell's Intelligence*.

"Private advices from Port Royal say that many of the female Abolitionists who went to Port Royal to teach the little negroes how to read and pray, have been seized within a few months to abandon their black charges and open nurseries on their own private account. An officer informed us recently that no less than sixty white spinners had contributed to the population in and about Port Royal. The climate seems to favor population even more than the production of so valuable cotton by paid negro labor."

"The information furnished us by the floor concerning the sixty-four little muttons, has been confirmed by the testimony of Rev. Liberty Bellings, Lieutenant Colonel of the 1st South Carolina regiment, who is here in consequence of ill health. He said it is sad truth."
