THE NEW YORK LEADER on the RE-ELECTION of LINCOLN.—The New York Leader, speaking of the movement now on foot to place Abraham Lincoln again on the course as a candidate for the Presidency, says:

"It is generally understood that Abraham Lincoln is quite anxious to serve another term in the White House and that his friends are working late and early to secure him the nomination of his party.—We hope he won't get it. We have nothing against Mr. Lincoln personally; but a President who can sit quietly and crack jokes in the White House, while he permits an old fossil like Secretary Welles to manage the Navy Department, is not the kind of a man we admire. The mere fact that Mr. Lincoln has kept old Mr. Welles in office while our commerce is being ruined by rebel privateers, will cost him thousands of votes if he ever comes before the people again as a candidate for the Presidency."

FREMONT IN THE FIELD.—We understand that the friends of General Fremont have determined to put him in the field as a Presidential candidate without reference to the Baltimore Republican Convention, which is to meet next June. Already the German Republicans have taken the lead and their newspapers have put his name at the head of their columns. A mass convention is to be held at Cleveland on the tenth of May next to give the Pathfinder a formal nomination. This is an important movement in many respects, and may force Fremont upon the Republican convention, if the Lincoln and Chase results as it may, in killing them both off as Presidential candidates.—World.

THE GEORGIA ORG.—It was but a few days ago that the departure of the Confederate steamer Florida, from a French port, was announced, to resume her depredations on our ocean commerce, and now, the A&S brings us intelligence that her consort, the Georgia, has left Brazil, doubtless to engage in the same infernal work.
