

A PROCLAMATION TO MY "HER- ING SISTERS."

The following from the Bangor May 14th, 1863, was good "take off." It displays full as much sound sense, and a great deal more wit, than the proclamation of "amnesty," and really reduces Lincoln in much better humor than Lincoln can do it himself.

Whereas, A dozen of my wayward "Sisters" did on a certain day, escape from my boarding-house, with a worthless scamp named Southern Confederacy, so called, without cause or provocation, having set up house keeping for themselves in a nicely shanty, situated south of the old Democratic : and

Whereas, This shanty was built on my land, which I inherited from my dear father; and,

Whereas, The aforesaid "Sisters" have become greatly reduced in circumstances, insomuch as to be in want of certain necessaries such as tea, bacon and dimity; and,

Whereas, The rebellious spirit of a portion of these "Sisters" has become subdued, they having repented of transgressions and become converted to the Abrahamic faith;

Therefore, I in the sweetness of my temper and in the magnanimity of my generous nature, do ordain, promulgate, set forth and lay down the condition upon which they may be received again into my bosom:

First: These runaway females, above mentioned, are required to pack up their ear-rings, bosome-pins, wigs, combs, perfume bottles, caps and sashes, candle moulds and all other ornaments, usually denominated in "housekeeping," and deliver the same within thirty days at Fortress Monroe, in the care of Major General Butler, who has a peculiar knack for the "sa-keeping," of other people's property.
