Twenty-eight Vice Presidents and twen ty-one Secretaries were then selected by committee on organization of thirty members. A committe on resolutions composed of twenty-eight members was also appointed, who reported the resolutions we append to day.

An electoral ticket was then chosen, at the head of which stand the names of R. L. Johnston, Esq., of Cambria, and Richard Vaux of Philadelphia, as electors at large, or Senatorial Electors. On the same electoral ticket, we find

the names of Thaddens Banks, for the Seventeenth District, and Joseph M. Thompson, for the Twentieth District. The general delegates to the Chicago onvention, are Geo. W. Cass, of Pittsburg; William Bigler, of Clearfield; Wm. A. lalbraith, of Erie, and Wm. V. McGrath, of Philadelphia.

From our dictrict the Delegates are Wm. A. Wallace, of Clearfield, and Wm. A. Galbraith, of Erie.
