THE approaching Presidential election is unquestionably to be the most important ever held since the establishment of our Government. Upon its results may not unlike depend the continuance of our republican government on this continent. The liberties of the people have been invaded, under the pretence of preserving liberty; their rights assailed under a pretended defense of those rights; their constitutional privileges destroyed under the plea of sustaining the Constitution. The power and influence of our Government among nations has been frittered away, and a monarchy established on our borders, without so much as a protest from the Washington Administration. The right of asylum has been violated with the connivance and aid of the Administration, and foreigners, who had sought a home on our shores, have been kidnapped by United States officials, and sent out of the country, in violation of law and right.

The Liberty of the press has been trampled - newspapers have been suppressed by military power, persons have been seized, imprisoned, punished, without warrant, without trial, without judicial examination, and our boasted freedom is fast becoming a byword and a mockery.

Finally, the President has avowed his determination to convert the war into an abolition crusade, and release to entertain propositions for peace, except upon condition of the abandonment of slavery in all the States.
