THE NEWS.

A resolution has been passed by the United States, ordering the Committee on the Conduct of war to begin at once an investigation of the Wilmington disaster. General Butler was relieved from command at the request of General Grant who, on January 6th, telegraphed the President that he wished Butler's removal. After a consultation with General Halleck and Assistant Secretary of War Banister, the order was issued which sent Butler to Lowell, Massachusetts.

From all the various reports it seems that General Hood, in the recent campaign in front of Nashville, and on his retreat, lost about seventy-five hundred men killed, and wounded, and captured, and fifty pieces of artillery. General Thomas reports that Hood crossed to the South Bank of the Tennessee in safety at Florence, on December 29th. Hood on his advance against Nashville, captured seventeen hundred Federal prisoners.

At four o'clock on last Monday afternoon Mr. Blair and General Singleton were received by the confederate pickets in front of General Ord's (late Butler's) lines, on the north bank of the James, and were escorted to the Spottsylvania House, in Richmond.

The Confederates under General Rosser, captured Beverly, in West Virginia, with its Federal garrison, on Wednesday morning. They did not remain long in the town.

At Charleston the Confederates have captured two Federal barges, with twenty-five prisoners. They ventured too near Fort Sumter.

It is rumored that General Sheridan is to be the successor of Butler. Ord now has his command temporarily.—Age Jan. 11th.

In accordance with Circular No. 152 of A. A. Pro. Mar. Gens. Office, Western Division of Pennsylvania, the Commissioners and Surgeon of the Board of Enrollment of the 19th District of Pennsylvania, will hold a session at the Court House, in the Borough of Clearfield, for the purpose of correcting the Enrollment Lists of Clearfield Co., on January the 26, 27th, and 28th.

Citizens throughout the County are earnestly called upon to aid the officers in the discharge of their duties, by giving all information bearing upon this important subject.

It must be distinctly understood by the people of their only surety of a fair proportion of the burdens of the draft lies in the proper Justice of the Peace. And the Justices of the Peace in the different Townships and Boroughs of Clearfield county, are required, as soon as full proceedings are had before them, to make return of the same, immediately, with all costs, to the District Attorney. If the above requirements are fully complied with, witnesses and parties will not be unnecessarily detained at Court, and a vast amount of costs will be saved both to the county, and to individuals.
