STEAM SAW-MILL MACHINERY

FOR SALE.  
CONSISTING OF ONE BOILER, 24 FEET  
long, and 36 feet diameter, having two re-  
turn flues of 16 inches diameter each, with 72  
feet of iron smoke-pipe, safety-valve and all such  
fittings complete. Engines for the same is two feet  
stroke and twelve inches bore, with governor,  
pump, steam-connections pipes, with requisite  
globe and governor valves and haster. All the  
shafting and pulleys requisite for driving a large  
circular saw mill. A larger and jack-wheel for  
hauling in logs are attached.  
One other boiler with smoke-pipe, arch iron,  
and other attachments, same as above, set in a  
separate arch. Having with it an engine of 16  
inches stroke and ten inches diameter, used for  
propelling a gang gate to which it is attached.—  
One 38 inch circular saw, two smaller do., for  
edger and cross-cut door for sawing off boards  
and slabs. All the belting connected with the  
works, five log and board cars, about 1000 feet of  
fat railroad iron, 13 wide by 2 inch thick, to-  
gether with all the tools in use about the mill.  
The engines, boilers and machinery are in per-  
fect order, under one roof, and constitute one  
complete mill. They can be set up separately, or  
can be conveniently disconnected, or sold  
together, as may be desired by the purchaser.  
Iron for a water mill, including an iron water  
wheel on a wrought-iron shaft, no longer in use, are  
likewise offered for sale cheap.  
The mill is at Granville, Bradford county, Pa.,  
seven miles from the station on the Williamsport
