How NEGRO TROOPS WERE RAISED.—It was stated by Mr. T. E. Lloyd, President of the Board of Aldermen, in the remarks upon the subject of negro suffrage, in the Washington City Council at a late meeting of that body that the most of the negroes who went from the District of Columbia into the army "were taken possession of by men of their own color, and sold into the service of the United States."
