A MAP.—The citizens of this county have long labored under a great inconvenience for want of a county map. We are pleased to learn that this, for the future, can be obviated, providing they now do their duty in this particular. Mr. Pomeroy, of Philadelphia, has published maps for some of the adjoining counties, and is now engaged on one for Jefferson. They are gotten up in an excellent style, and from surveys made upon the ground, showing township, borough and tract lines, with the names of the owners, together with the location of all the School Houses, Churches and Post offices, as well as the course of every stream, and all the public and private roads, coal beds, limestone and iron ore. We hope our citizens will give all the encouragement in their power, to Mr. Pomeroy, so as to induce him to undertake and complete this much needed map. The price we believe is \$8.

TRUTH.—Hon. S. S. Cox, in his recent speech at the Washington ratification meeting, thus tersely stated the present political issues: "The conflict now is between bureaucracy and Democracy; between the ramp and executive; between State existence and State destruction; between Constitution and anarchy; between liberty ordered by law and liberty disordered by Radicalism; between Union and Disunion; between perpetual peace and incessant agitation."

COURT MARTIAL.—The Judge Advocate General, Mr. Joseph Holt, has just decided that no authority for the trial of a civilian by court martial can be found in any of the Articles of War, those articles being enacted solely for the government of the armies of the United States, and being applicable only to persons in the military service. He considers it strictly legal, however, to try by military courts civilians formerly in the service for crimes committed whilst in the service. By this decision the supremacy of the civil courts, in all cases where citizens are concerned, is acknowledged, and it would seem that the days of military trials of civilians have passed by.—Philadelphia Ledger.

This is certainly a remarkable decision for Holt to make, after trying, hanging and filling Forts and Penitentiaries with civilians. Holt must be turning "copperhead," or he would not have discovered that he had been violating the law and Constitution of his country, or the "government" may have whispered in his ear.
