PASSED.—The "Fish Bill," has passed both Houses of the Legislature, and now awaits the signature of the Governor. The provisions of the bill, extend from the New York line, on the North Branch, from the mouth of Bennett's Branch, on the Sinnemahoning, from Patchinville on the West Branch, and from Hollidaysburg on the Juniata, to the Maryland line. The bill compels the owners of dams on all those streams, to erect sluices, or such devices as will allow the free passage of fish up said streams, by the first of November next, under heavy pains and penalties.
