Death of Lieut. Gen. Winfield Scott. The venerable hero, Lieutenant Gen. Winfield Scott, is no more. He breathed his last at West Point, N. Y., on the 29th ult., at eleven o'clock, at the advanced age of nearly eighty years.

Gen. Scott was born June 13, 1780, near Petersburg, Virginia. He was descended from a Scotch family, who were obliged to take refuge in America after the rebellion of 1745.

He was appointed to the command of the 1st Artillery, and was ordered the following year to join the army in Louisiana, under the command of Gen. Wilkinson.
