Court Proceedings.

The following is a synopsis of the proceedings and doings of Court for June term, 1866:

There was a more full attendance of the Grand Jury than usual, and they disposed of the business brought before them in a prompt and judicious manner.

Court opened at two o'clock, P. M., on Monday, the 18th, when the names of the Jurors were called.

George Horton, Taylor Rowles and Andrew Shagart were selected by the sheriff as Tipstuffs.

Commonwealth vs. H. F. Sargent - Indicted for robbery. True bill. Bench warrant issued.

Commonwealth vs. John Killian and James Smith - Indicted for assault and battery upon an officer. True bill. Recognizance forfeited.

Commonwealth vs. George P. Tate - Indicted for malicious mischief. True bill. Sentenced to pay costs of prosecution, and give bail in \$100, to keep the peace toward all good citizens for one year.

COMMON PLEAS - FIRST WEEK. R. F. HASLET, trustee, vs. WILLIAM CARR & Co. - Feigned issue. Jury called. Verdict for Plaintiff.

JAMES CONNOR et al., heirs of Elias Long, dec'd vs. S. JACKSON HORN & ANDREW LINDLEY - Ejectment for five-sixths of 200 acres of land in Brady tp. Case continued at the cost of Plaintiff.

HENRY PENTZ, use of Jos. Lines, vs. S. W. THOMPSON - Summons in case upon promises. Jury called, and return a verdict for Plaintiff for \$179.47.

FRED K. SHOFF vs. ANDREW SHOFF - Summons in debt. Settled. Judgment confessed for Plaintiff for \$125.

P. W. BARRETT, use of Jno. G. Hall, vs. JACOB KUNTZ, Adm'r. of George Bonshor - Scire Facias. Judgment of nol. pros. against Plaintiff.

DANIEL E. BRUBAKER vs. S. W. THOMPSON & JOHN PATTON - Appeal from Justice Dressler, of Union tp., by Defendants. The Defendants confess judgment for Plaintiff for \$96.51.

JOHN BYRES vs. SAMUEL SHOFF, Adm'r. of C. Shoff - Scire Facias. Jury called, and find for Plaintiff the sum of \$33.50.

WILLIAM IRVIN vs. WM. T. BLOOM & L. B. BLOOM - Ejectment for 120 acres of land in Knox tp. Jury called and find verdict for Plaintiff for \$1,587.69.

Petition to vacate the road from the cross roads near the Catholic Church, to the public road that passes through T. A. Hoover's farm, in Penn township. Viewers, Thomas Moore, John McIntyre, Patrick Daily.

To view a road from the end of a lane on the land of Othello Smead, to a point on or near the land of Daniel Byers, in Burnside twp. Viewers, Horace Patchin, M. Mitchell, William Owens.

To view a road from Wm. Irvin's to Adam Korb's, and to vacate a road from Korb's to the Cream Hill turnpike, in Bloom tp. Viewers, Samuel F. McCloskey, James Thompson, W. P. Chambers.

To change the road from George Hall's to Samuel Fullerton's, in Lawrence tp. Viewers, P. C. Heisey, Henry Galich, George Hall.

To view a private road leading from John Logan's, in Decatur tp., to the mouth of Sanborn run, in Boggs tp. Viewers, Samuel F. McCloskey, Jas. Forest, George Dialing.

To change and vacate in part, or the whole, a road leading from Thompson & Smith's first Mill, to the road at or near McClintock's, in Boggs tp. Viewers, S. F. McCloskey, John Bish, J. R. Read.

The petition for viewers to examine a route for a road from the mouth of Haslet's run, in Bell tp., to a point on the Pennville and Pat. sawtany road, was continued from March term, and Alexander Irvin, W. T. Gilbert and Hiram McClintock were appointed viewers.

A petition was presented, numerous signed by citizens of Beccaria, Gulch and Woodward tps., praying to have the bridge, erected over Clearfield creek, at Puseyville, declared a County bridge. Viewers, Wm. Hagerty, John Witherow, Geo. Groom.

A petition numerous signed by the citizens of Beccaria, Gulch and Woodward tps., was presented, praying to have parts of those townships erected into an independent School District. The Court appointed Jas. Forrest, G. H. Lytle and Henry Swan commissioners to view and examine the premises and report at next term.

A petition of the citizens of Knox tp. was presented, asking the appointment of Isaac Dunlap as Supervisor until the next election, in the room of Isaac McKee, dec'd. The petition was granted.

The Court approved the recommendation made by the Grand Jury at January term, for the appropriation of \$400, out of the county funds, for the erection of a bridge across Trout run, in Goshen township.

The Court also confirmed the proceedings of the Inquest held by John Lawbe, Esq., Burgess of Osceola, on the body of Maximilian Dubault, who was killed on the 23d of January last, by being struck on the head with a limb of a tree.
