Applicants for premiums must furnish the Committee with a statement, signed by themselves, under a pledge of veracity, of the quantity of grain raised on the ground entered for premium, and must state correctly as he can the kind and quality of seed sown, and the time and mode of putting it in the ground.

Persons entering field crops for exhibition, or intending to do so, may give notice to the Executive Committee at any time, and have the field measured and examined by a committee while growing.
