## GENERAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania entitled "An act to regulate the General Election within this Commonwealth," it is enjoined upon the Sheriff of the several counties to give public notice of such election, the places where to be held, and the officers to be elected.

Therefore, I, **JACOB A. FAUST**, High Sheriff of Clearfield county, do hereby give Public Notice to the electors of the county of Clearfield, that a general election will be held on the **second Tuesday of October next**, (being the 9th day of the month), at the several election districts in said county, at which time and place the qualified voters will vote.

For one person for Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

For one person to represent the counties of Cameron, Clearfield, Elk, Erie, Forest, Jefferson, McKean and Warren in the House of Representatives of the United States.

For one person to represent the counties of Clearfield, Elk and Forest in the House of Representatives of this Commonwealth.

For two persons for the office of Associate Judges of Clearfield county.

For one person for the office of Commissioner of Clearfield county.

For one person for the office of Auditor of Clearfield county.

AN ACT regulating the mode of voting at all elections in the several counties of this Commonwealth.

SECTION 1. It is enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general elections, hold a special election, and it is hereby enacted, that the mode of voting shall be as follows:

One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for, and to be labelled, "judiciary"; one ticket shall embrace the names of the state officers voted for, and to be labelled, "state"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of senator, member, and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for, and to be labelled "county"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and to be labelled "borough"; and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the sheriff in the several counties of this Commonwealth, to insert in their election proclamations, hereafter to be issued, the first section of this act.

Whereas, by the act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An Act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the enrolling and calling out the national force, and for other purposes," and approved March 3rd, 1862, it is made unlawful for any person to obstruct or hinder the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty or disability therein provided, are deemed, and taken, to have voluntarily relinquished, and forfeited their rights of citizenship, and their rights to become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof.

And Whereas, Persons, not citizens of the United States, are not under the constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all elections heretofore to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballot or ballots, from any person, or persons, (unless in the provisions, and subject to the disability imposed by said act of Congress, approved March 3rd, 1862, and approved March 3rd, 1863, it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot, or ballots, or to receive any such unlawful ballot, or ballots, from any such disqualified person, or persons, or to receive any such unlawful ballot, or ballots, and, upon conviction thereof, shall, for each offence, be sentenced in any case to not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment, in the jail of the proper county for not less than sixty days.

SECTION 2. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall, at any election, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote, a ballot, or ballots, any person
