SELPHISHNESS.—It is a shame for a
rich Christian to be like a Christmas
box, that receives all, and nothing can
be got out till it is broken in pieces.

Our literature is full of sighing and
sobbing sentimentality over the un-
satisfying character of life. Christian-
ity offers an incessant rebuke to this
discontent, and points the failing
soul to "glory, immortality and eter-
nal life" as the solution of all this prob-
lem.

A granite monument, like that of
Bunker Hill, that will defy the storms of
ages and outlast the wear and tear of
centuries, cannot be made of loose
sand or sun-dried brick; and a heroic
Christian life, which will extort the
praise of skeptics like Hume, cannot
be constructed from the easy creeds
out of which the vital doctrines of the
Gospel have been eliminated.

Dr. Johnson used to say, "He who
wants to do a great deal of good at once
will never do any." "Little by little"
is the way in which Providence opens
to us opportunities of usefulness. We
may not rule a city, but we can rule
our own spirit. To found a university
may not be in our power, but we can
give a cup of cold water in the name
of Christ.

Rowland Hill once said, when striv-
ing to illustrate God's love to his peo-
ple, "I am unable to reach the lofty
theme—yet I do not think that the
smallest fish that swims in the bound-
less ocean ever complains of the im-
measurable vastness of the deep. So
it is with me; I can plunge, with my
puny capacity, into a subject, the im-
mensity of which I may never be able
to fully comprehend."

The brief limits imposed upon man's
earthly existence, especially when con-
sidered in connection with his capaci-
ties and longings, show that the natu-
ral life is not only worthless, but
worse than worthless for such a being,
if it has not a befitting destiny be-
yond death. The elephant, the owl,
the toad outlive him. The apparently
long perspective which in childhood
seemed to extend before him, is found
in old age to have been an illusion, and
his years seem like a shadow which
has flitted over a desert.

Solomon furnishes us with an emi-
nently practical prescription: "What-
soever thy hand findeth to do, do it
with thy might." Here we have an
appeal to the individual in the crowd,
or the personal in the collective. Let
us not dissipate our responsibility. It
is by each soldier bravely doing his
duty that an army conquers; it is by
each insect industriously working that
the hive is stored with honey; it is by
each insect faithfully putting forth all
its might that the coral reef becomes
an island, and cities rise from the bot-
tom of the deep. "As we have there-
fore opportunity, let us do good unto
all men, especially unto them who are
of the household of faith."

Did you ever think how every part
of your house can remind you of the
great truths which Jesus Christ taught
of himself? The corner-stone says,
"Christ is the Corner-stone," the door,
"I am the door," the burning candle,
"Christ is the Light of the World."
You look out of the window, and the
sight of the starry sky bids you turn
your eyes to "the bright and Morning
Star." The rising sun speaks of the
"Sun of righteousness, with healing
in his wings." The loaf on your table
whispers of the "bread of life," and
the water which quenches your thirst,
"I am the water of life." When you
lie down, you think of Him who had
not yet to lay His head; and when you
get up you rejoice that He is "the
resurrection and the life."

OUR MERCIES.—The talents which
we have received are many and great.
What plainer instructions, or more
forcible persuasions, or more constant
admonitions, in season and out of
season? Sermons, till we have been
weary of them; and Sabbaths, till we
profaned them; Excellent books in
such plenty that we know not which
to read? What people have had God
so near them? or have seen so much
of Christ crucified before their eyes?
or have had heaven or hell so open
unto them? What speed should such
a people make for heaven? How should
they fly that are thus winged? And
how swift would they sail that have
wind and tide to help them! A small
measure of grace bestows not such a
people, nor will an ordinary diligence
in the work of God excuse them. All
our lives have been filled with mercies.
God has mercifully poured out upon
us the riches of sea and land, of heaven
and earth. We are fed and clothed
with mercy. We have mercies within
and without. To number them, is to
count the stars or the sands of the
seashore. If there is any difference
between hell and earth—yes, or heaven
and earth—then certainly we have re-
ceived mercy. If the blood of the
Son of God be mercy, then we
are engaged to God by mercy.
Shall God think nothing too much nor
too good for us, and shall we think
all too much that we do for Him?
When I compare my slow and unpro-
fitable life with the frequent and won-
derful mercies received, it shames me,
it silences me, and leaves me inexcu-
sable.
