Contrary, then, to the opinion of those men who hold that a wise man should admire nothing, I say that a truly wise and good man should admire everything, or rather that infiniteness of wisdom and omnipotence which shows itself in every visible object.

I pray God that I may never sink down to the dishonorable depths of indolence which some Christians live in; sooner may my right hand forget her cunning, and my tongue speak no more my Master's word—I were utterly unworthy to be his minister, if such were the case; but oh!
