During that time every one of the European races has mingled its blood with ours.

Under this policy our Common wealth has grown and prospered, until three and half millions of people yield obedience to her laws, and aid in maintaining her prosperity and her fame. Marks of taste, of wealth, and of intellectual advancement are abundant. Side by side the school house and the church spire speak of duty to man and adoration to Deity. Our right to adopt it was as clear as is our right to local self-government; and the same right belongs equally to every State as fully and exclusively as it did to our own. Nature, wisdom, and experience will teach them, as it has taught us, that the political power of the State should be wielded by the white race alone. 
