joined on Tuesday last. The term

tors were elected expired with this
session, viz:

2. George Connell, Rep., Phila.
3. George Landau, Rep., Bradford.
4. D. L. Shoemaker, Rep., Lutzeine.
5. Warren Cowles, Rep., McKean.
6. A. Hiestand Glatz, Dem., York.
7. David M'Conaughy, Rep., Adams.
8. Harry White, Rep., Indiana.
9. Wm. A. Wallace, Dem., Clearfield.
10. Jas. L. Graham, Rep., Allegheny.
11. R. A. Brown, Rep., Lawrence.

Of the eleven Senators retiring,
there are Radicals and two Democrats.
The two Democratic Senators have
decidedly Democratic districts, and
will have Democratic successors.
The Democrats will without doubt
elect their nominees in the 4th, 12th
and 19th districts, now held by Radicals,
and they may even carry the 2d. If so,
they will control the next Senate.
To avoid such a result Mr. Shan-
gan, of the Centre district, was ejected
from his seat by the Radicals.

The Radicals of Chicago are still
much exercised about the habits of
Senator Yates. They do not consider
picked cabbage a "trooly loil" diet,
and they do think that the Black
Crock costume in which he sometimes
shows himself to the boarders at
Willards, is not the proper Senatorial
drapery. It is said that "prominent
Republicans" will address him a letter,
"which, it is hoped, will have a
good effect;" in other words, prevent
him from going to bed with his breech-
es on, and appearing at breakfast
without them. A committee of Re-
publican Senators have notified him
that he must do one of three things,
viz: 1. Behave himself; 2. Resign;
or 3. Be expelled. A dispatch from
Washington says that Mr. Yates has
just recovered from a severe indisposi-
tion. It seems to have been very
severe this time.

MORE CHANGE.—It is said that the
Congressional Jacobins intend increas-
ing the number of Supreme Judges
to thirteen, so as to give them a ma-
jority in the court, just as soon as
President Johnson is gotten rid off.
