Letter from Mr. Pendleton.

Below we publish a private letter from Mr. Pendleton, strongly endorsing Mr. Seymour for President. It breathes a pure spirit of patriotism and will endear its author still more to his hosts of warm friends throughout the country.

My DEAR SIR: You left my office this morning before I was aware of it. I sought you at home, but you were not there. I must say what I want to by note. As soon as you get to New York see Governor Seymour. You know what was my feeling before and after I heard from him last fall. He is to-day the foremost man in our party in the United States.

General Meade has issued an order declaring Colonel J. H. Christy, the democratic candidate for Congress from the Sixth District, to be duly elected. Georgia so far has done better than any other Southern State—four out of her seven Congressmen being Democrats.

The family of General Grant consists of himself and Mrs. Grant, Frederick, a youth of 18, now a cadet at West Point; Ulysses, Jr., about 15 years old; Nellie, an only daughter, and Jesse, the baby, who is named after the General's father; and they cost the people \$30,000 annually.
