THE GREAT DEBT.—At the close of
the war, in April, 1865, the National
debt amounted to the sum of two thousand,

My Dear Sir— I have concluded not
to be a candidate for President Judge
of this district. My friends, as far as
I could consult them, have finally ac-
quiesced in this decision. My opinion in

to defeat the claims of Clearfield coun-
