PRESIDENT JOHNSON'S GREETING TO HIM.
Our gallant nominees for President, on Friday last, opened the campaign in earnest. Twenty thousand people were present at Buffalo to hear his speech. President Johnson, learning that Mr. Seymour had concluded to make vigorous canvass before the people, sent him the following dispatch:

EXECUTIVE MASSON.
WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 22, 1868.

Horatio Seymour.—I see it announced in the papers that you have resolved that you will enter the political canvas in 1869. I trust this may be, as the present position of public affairs dictates and demands it. It is hoped and believed by your friends that all the available means will be used to procure your nomination or ascend, without a contest; and that their wasted and unmerit expenses together with their wasteful and profuse use of the people's treasure, will be signalized and exposed and rebuked.

—The people should not be assailed against the enemies of the despotic power now ready to enter the very gates of the citadel of liberty. I trust that you may speak with an inspired tongue, and that your voice may penetrate every corner of the land. Let the living principles of a violated Constitution be proclaimed and restored; that peace, prosperity and fraternal feeling may return to a divided and oppressed nation.

The Democratic gain in the State of Indiana at the election on the 13th was nearly 14,000. The Radical majority for Governor is less than eight hundred, and will be overcome on the 3d by at least 5,000 for Seymour and Blair.

"LOLIET" ANSWER.—If it was wrong for "four niggers" to vote the Democratic ticket in Lawrence township at the late election, why was it not also wrong for 10,000 negroes to vote the "loil" ticket in Ohio, on the same day?

NOT CORRECT.—We notice that all our exchanges who publish the names of the members elected to the Legislature, give the name of John W. Wallace as the member from this district. This is a mistake. Thomas J. McCullough, Esq., has been re-elected by a 1,680 majority.

Some weak-kneed Democrats seem to think it of little use to go to the election on the 3d of November, because we were defeated in October. This is all wrong. If their christian faith is no stronger than this, they will surely wake up in hell with old Brownlow, when they shuffle off this hemisphere.

We are requested by the Sheriff to state, to the jurors drawn and notified to attend Court on the 2d Monday (9th) of November next, that they need not appear, as all the causes for the first week have been continued, but those drawn for the second week (16th) are requested to be promptly on hand.

CONGRESSIONAL GAIN.—The Democrats have gained eight members of Congress in the elections thus far held. In Pennsylvania 3; Ohio 3; Indiana 1; Oregon 1. This is at least something for Democrats to rejoice over. This is the proper and only legal way to reconstruct—the people themselves.

The two greatest political villains (with the exception, perhaps, of Ben Butler) of the age, Jack Coevoe and the impeacher Ashley, have been defeated for Congress. Jim Ashley has issued an address complaining bitterly over his defeat. Good for him; let him now go and stay in the New York penitentiary with his colleague Conover.

THE VOTE.—The aggregate vote polled for Governor, in 1866, was 597,370—Democratic 290,966 and Radical 307,274. The vote this year for Auditor General foots up 652,459—Democratic 321,891 and Radical 321,968—being an increase over 1866 of 55,099 and over 1867 of 117,889. The Democrats increased their vote 31,395, and the Radicals only 23,794.

Some white-skinned "loliets" charge that "four negroes were led up to the township window in this town, and voted the Democratic ticket." There is not a decent "nigger" anywhere, if he consults his interest, but will do the same thing after he is enfranchised by white "loliets." Why, these "loil" carpet-baggers will not only cheat Sambo out of his liberty, but his ivory—if they can get him to hold still long enough.

The Radical newspapers are just now filled with all kinds of horrible murders, riots and assassinations committed in the Southern States. This will be their stock in trade until after the election. These lying villains, while they are slandering the people of the South, prove one thing conclusively: That "reconstructed" Tennessee, with the "gody" Brownlow for its Governor, is a far wickeder place than either of the "rebel unreconstructed" States of Virginia or Mississippi.

ENCOURAGING.—In November, 1866, (eight years ago,) the Democratic majority in this county was only 184—or, we should say, but 111, the Bell & Everett electoral ticket receiving 23 votes in the county. Lincoln carried the State by 72,404. Yet now we have a majority in the county of 1,142 while the disunion majority in the State is only 9,677. No one should be discouraged while Democracy is progressing at this rate. One more grand rally will wipe out the gigantic majority of 1866, and put the enemies of the Union to flight. The majority on Congress is only 7,069.
